"Laudianism" is a controversial, but widely used, term that refers to the theological, ecclesiological, liturgical and other policies predominant in the Church of England in the 1630s and commonly associated most with Archbishop William Laud and likeminded clergymen. This presentation how Laudianism investigates unfolded at the parish level in the Archdeaconry of Nottingham. More specifically, it analyzes patterns of continuity and change with regard to the behavior of clergymen, churchwardens and lay persons from
