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Impact of COVID-19 in the Austin Region Background Information on Economic Activity in the Region

Businesses in Austin have experienced a sharp decline in economic activity due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the ensuing stay-home orders enacted by the City of Austin and the Government of Texas. The University of Houston's Hobby School of Public Affairs conducted an on-line survey of Austin area businesses at the request of the City of Austin and the Austin Chamber of Commerce. The survey sought to better understand the impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic and concomitant shutdowns on the businesses. The main report presents the results from the 1,050 Austin area business owners who completed the survey between June 11 and June 25. This ancillary report presents the most recent data from the U.S. Census Bureau and other sources describing economic and business conditions in Austin at the time of the survey.

Impact on Small Businesses in Austin

The impact has been the hardest among small and medium businesses. Results from the seventh wave of the US Census Bureau's Small Business Pulse Survey conducted around the time when the Hobby School survey was in the field show that 83% of small businesses in the Austin Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) have suffered a large or moderate negative effect on their business activities due to COVID-19 (Figure 1).

In contrast, less than 15% responded that the impact is little or no effect, while slightly less than 3% expressed that the pandemic has a positive impact on their businesses.

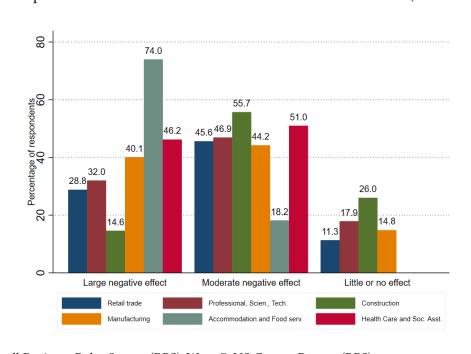


Figure 2: Impact of COVID-19 on Austin MSA Small Businesses (Selected Sectors)

As reflected in Figure 2 (and Table A1 in the Appendix), the sectors experiencing the largest negative impact are manufacturing; accommodation and food services; health services; professional services; construction; and retail trade, except for food, groceries and cleaning goods. Table A2 in the Appendix shows that these sectors also experienced the largest numbers of unemployment claims in Texas. Labor market conditions in Travis County and the Austin region are discussed in Section 3.

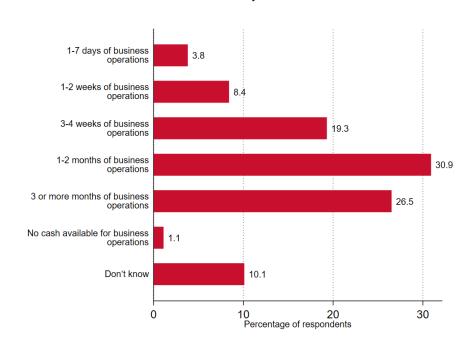


Figure 3: Financial Constraints Faced by Small Businesses in Austin MSA

It should be noted the analysis from the Hobby School survey show that Austinbased businesses are facing important financial constraints, which will likely hinder economic recovery in the region. Businesses have experienced sharp drops in revenue yet they still need access to capital to cover their outstanding costs, expenditures and other financial liabilities to remain in business. At present, most small firms report having limited access to cash to defray those costs (see Figure 3).

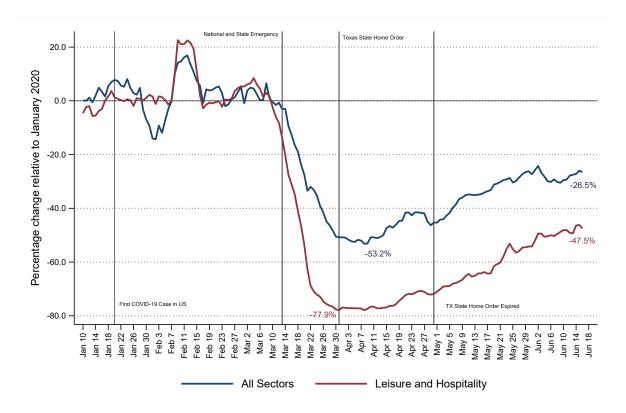
Question 10: How would you describe the current availability of cash on hand for this business, including any financial assistance or loans? Currently, cash on hand will cover...

By mid-June there were signs of recovery compared to the April figures, but due to higher contagion rates and uncertainty about the ability to contain the spread of COVID-19, at the time the Hobby School survey was in the field aggregate sales, business revenue, and employment income have stabilized at a lower activity level when contrasted with pre-COVID-19 levels.

Chetty, et al. (2020) calculate the change in small business daily revenue in the Austin MSA relative to January 2020. The blue line in Figure 4 represents the change in small business revenue in all sectors for which data is available. The red line describes the change in small business revenue in the Leisure and Hospitality sector, the most-affected industry in the Austin area. The authors found that the small business revenue dropped substantially after President Trump and Governor Abbott declared National Emergency and State of Disaster in Texas, respectively, on March 13, and hit to the lowest level, on average, after Texas imposed the

stay-at-home order on March 31, 2020. According to estimates by Chetty et al. 2020, overall revenue in the Austin area bottomed out from a low level of -50% in the second week of April when contrasted to January 2020. Yet in comparison to January, overall business revenue remained 26.5% lower in the second week of June.

Figure 4: Change in Small Business Revenue in Austin MSA relative to January 2020



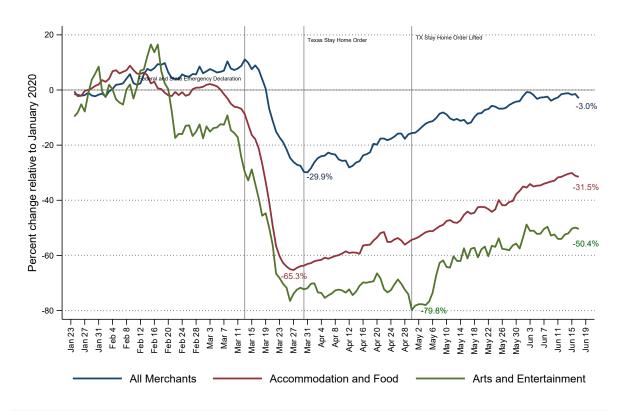

As discussed above the most-impacted industry during the pandemic is Leisure and Hospitality. The industry recorded a negative change in revenue even before March 13 when the federal and the State of Texas decreed the National Emergency

and State of Disaster respectively. The largest record change was about -78% on April 8. The industry is experiencing the slowest recovery in comparison to other sectors. As of June 18, 2020, the sectoral revenue was still 47% below the January 2020 level. Table A3 in the Appendix presents the percentage change in small business revenue relative to January 2020 in the Austin MSA for other sectors or industries.

Changes in business revenue are directly related to changes in consumer spending. Figure 5 illustrates the percentage change in average consumer spending in Austin MSA relative to January 2020. The blue line represents the change in average consumer spending for all merchants, whereas the red and green lines depict the

sectors of "Accommodation and Food" and "Arts and Entertainment", respectively. After the declarations of the National Emergency and the State of Disaster, consumer spending fell dramatically. It remained low after the stay-at-home order was imposed. The largest percentage change in consumer spending in all sectors was about 30% on March 31, 2020, compared to January 2020. However, as of June 18, the situation was much improved and almost returned to the pre-pandemic level. The average consumer spending was 3% below the level in January 2020.

The drop in spending was stronger in some specific sectors. For example, consumer spending dropped more than 60% in the industries of "Accommodation and Food" and "Arts and Entertainment." The lowest level for the "Arts and Entertainment" sector relative to January was -79.8% (recorded on April 30), followed by -65.3% for the "Accommodation and Food" sector (on March 27). Like other sectors in the Austin area, these two sectors have been recovering recently. However, as of June 18, the "Arts and Entertainment" sector was still 31.5% below the level in January, and the "Arts and Entertainment" sector was still 50% below the pre-pandemic level.

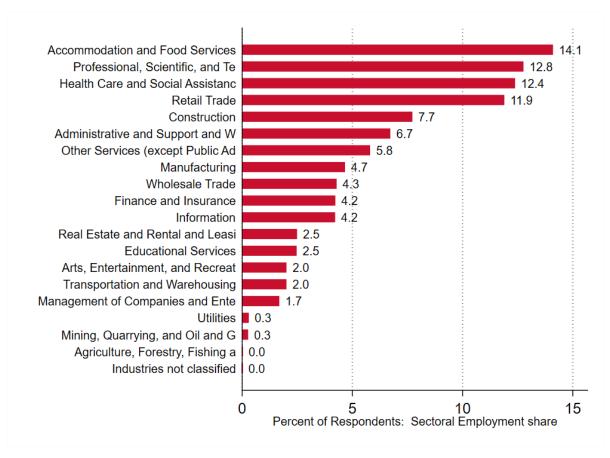


Figure 6: Employment Share by Industry in Travis County

Importantly, the industries experiencing the hardest hits by COVID-19 account for over fifty percent of the jobs in the region, according to the Quarterly Workforce Indicators compiled by the U.S. Census Bureau.² Figure 6 describes the employment share by industry in Travis County. These industries are also more likely to employ female, minority, and less-educated workers (see also Table A5-A11 in the Appendix).

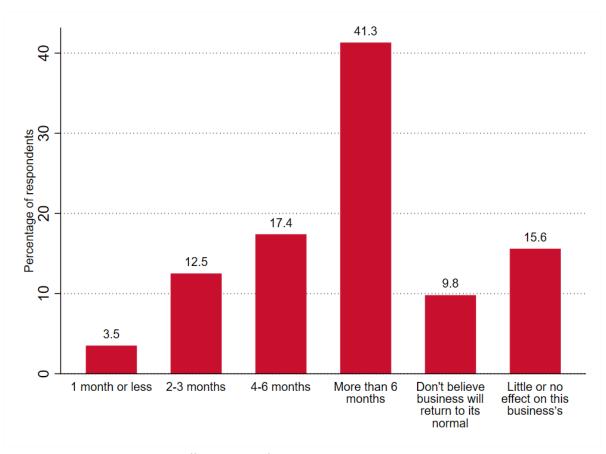


Figure 7: Time to recovery to pre-COVID-19 level

While conditions have started to improve during the month of June, Figure 7 shows 41 percent of small business reported that it would take their business more than 6 months to return to normal, whereas 10 percent think their business is unlikely to return to a normal level of operations.

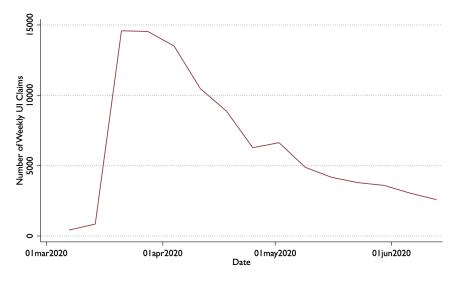

Labor Market Conditions

The decline in economic activity can also be reflected in the evolution of the weekly unemployment claims in Travis County and in the sharp unemployment increase in the Austin region. Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) reports the number of weekly unemployment insurance claims in Travis County. Figure 8 shows the total weekly unemployment insurance claims in the weeks of March 7 and March 14, 2020, were 420 and 847, respectively. It jumped up more than 17 folds to 14,585 claims in the week of March 21. Weekly unemployment claims remained at more than 10,000 claims for four weeks until the week of April 11, 2020, and gradually dropped to 2,583 in the week of June 13.

According to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), the rate of unemployment in the region of Austin-Round Rock-San Macros in April went up to 12.2%, from 3.8% in March, and drop slightly to 11.4% in May as illustrated in Figure 9. This April unemployment condition is consistent with the trend of weekly insurance claims, as observed in Figure 8.
